Invention of forceps marks beginning of Western medicine's development of obstetrics



Midwifery declines due to development of obstetrics & religious oversight...until negative effects were noticed and addressed with government support



The Page Act marks the end of open boarders prohibiting the entry of Chinese

The 1882 Chinese Exclusion Act prevented all immigration of Chinese immigrants including the wives of immigrants already living in the United States, from entering the country



Twilight birth method becomes widely used in developing countries and U.S



Various state anti-miscegenation laws prohibit the marriage of whites and Blacks, and in many states also Asians

1967 US Supreme Court unanimously ruled in Loving v. Virginia anti-miscegenation laws are unconstitutional

In 2012 the NPREC finalized national standards for the prevention of sexual assault in prison, including several guidelines addressing transgender issues

3 states defeat attempts to restrict or ban abortion - South Dakota, California, Oregon



Vice-President Mike Pence introduced the first federal legislation to defund Planned Parenthood, he signed 8 anti-abortion bills into law during less than four years as Governor of Indiana

What is Whiteness?

- Its origins date as far back as the 1600s.
- Whiteness was created as a social construct.
- Whiteness is a social construct that is not easily identified because of its insidious nature.
- The purpose was to keep power among the European elite and wealthy European immigrants in the Americas.
- The aim was to dominate class and power by making sure enslaved African and indigenous Native Americans would not organize against and overturn the wealthy class (Bacon's Rebellion).
- Once whiteness was codified into law, white supremacy became systemic.

The Ambiguity of Whiteness

Native Americans

Behavior and practices were not considered to "act white', particularly their participation in manual labor

Characteristics of White Culture

Characteristics that commonly show up in organizations and undermine the goal of promoting equity and access:

And what we might do instead!

Things that show up	Antidote
Perfectionism/fear of conflict	Focus on appreciating and learning
Sense of urgency	Realistic plans, acceptance of realistic timing
Defensiveness	Name the fear with empathy
Focus on content over process	Use process to support content
One right way	Honor and validate when alternatives work
One-way decision making	Everyone is accountable and responsible
Either/Or thinking	Look for more than two options, note nuance
Power Hoarding	Change is inevitable, challenging leadership is healthy
Individualism	Skillful teamwork
Progress = Bigger/More	Progress = Values based process
Objectivity	ID your Point of View (POV), See other POVs
Right to Comfort	Discomfort = Growth


A system of advantage based on race and supported by cultural and institutional structures, policies and practices that create and sustain advantages for the dominant white group while systematically harming other racial groups.


This relative advantage for whites and harm for people of color is supported by the actions of individuals, cultural norms and values, and the institutional structures and practices of society.


